Digital Literacy isn't just about using technology; it is about understanding it - The online world can be hard to navigate and understanding digital literacy can pose a challenge to many in society. The ability to find, evaluate, and communicate information using a device can be overwhelming at the best of times.

Daily tasks can seem impossible or frightening to some, when engaging in the digital world. Some people have never had to use online banking, book concert tickets, or pay for parking using their phones and the digital world can feel very different than what people have experienced before. Security and sharing personal information can frighten some and impacts on how users share and interact with their digital device.



The project is a safe, non-judgemental space for people to talk to the tutor about their unmet digital literacy issues and creates an opportunity to connect individuals with other services and programmes in KWETB and the community. The library will measure the benefits through pre and post engagement surveys and use the data to inform future projects.





Wicklow Library Service and KWETB partnered to provide one to one digital literacy clinics in four library locations across County Wicklow, in Arklow, Blessington, Greystones and Wicklow Town. The DigiLit programme is funded through the ALL Collaboration and Innovation fund and organised by the Adult Basic Education service. The project is a free service offered in libraries across the county and works on a one-to-one model of tuition. It is staffed by KWETB tutors and offers one-to-one help with digital skills, such as accessing information, online forms, setting up an email account, e-government services, online shopping and resources

Digital Literacy



Bookings for the sessions are managed by library staff and each session is 45 minutes. The target groups for this project includes individuals from groups identified in the ALL strategy, with many aged 55+.

DigiLit offers many benefits to the citizens of County Wicklow with personalised support, focused learning, skills development and confidentiality being the key benefits. The clinics were promoted through local media channels, and the KWETB's and library service network.


### WEST WICKLOW ABE STUDENT DAY OUT


Staff in Bray Adult Learning Centre were delighted to have their collaborative and innovative project win a national Media Literacy Ireland Award. Questions Matter, an educational project funded by the ALL Collaboration and Innovation Fund 2023 was shortlisted for the Best Community Based Media Literacy Initiative Award. Questions Matter was an educational collaboration project between 80:20, NALA, Bray Area Partnership and Bray Adult Learning Centre. An awards ceremony, attended by Bray Adult Learning Centre Coordinator Christine Wray took place on 21 November Virgin Media Studios, Dublin.

Questions Matter an initiative devised for adult education tutors and literacy educators seeking to develop critical thinking and digital citizenship skills to assess and challenge news and information. The micro learning short-course uses WhatsApp to embed active citizenship and digital literacy learning outcomes. After engaging on the course participants felt more prepared to spot and deal with any misleading or false information in an increasingly polarised digital world. It covers topics like: misinformation, how and why it spreads, what tools you can use as part of digital literacy and how you can protect both yourself and your students as part of active citizenship.




